Wilmington Chamber Board Passes Resolution in Support of Connect NC Bond

Wilmington, N.C. — At their regularly scheduled meeting on February 10th, the Wilmington Chamber of Commerce board of directors expressed support for the \$2 billion Connect NC bond that invests in North Carolina’s future. The bond endorsed by Governor McCrory will invest heavily in the UNC system, state community colleges, water and sewer projects statewide, parks, agriculture, and updating National Guard facilities.

Locally, UNCW will benefit through a \$66 million allotment for construction of an allied and applied health classroom and laboratory building to be used for training healthcare workers. The facility will also provide much needed academic support space for the College of Health and Human Services, which has seen soaring enrollment in recent years. In addition, Cape Fear Community College (CFCC) will receive \$5.9 million for facility improvements.

“It’s important to continue to invest in our university and community college systems, as they are a driving force for economic development statewide and for providing the workforce of the future,” said Chamber President & CEO Connie Majure-Rhett. “It’s been 15 years since the last general obligation bond was authorized to upgrade our state’s infrastructure and since then North Carolina has added 2 million people in population. The Connect NC bond will not require a tax increase, and we encourage everyone to vote yes for the bond on March 15th.”

Resolutions of support have also been passed by the board of trustees of UNCW and CFCC. The resolution passed by the Chamber board of directors is attached.

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RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE WILMINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT 2014 PATROL STAFF STUDY FINDINGS TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF UNIFORMED OFFICERS AND DETECTIVES

Whereas, the types of services a police department provides changes as a city grows, creating a need to examine staffing levels to determine whether or not the WPD is meeting the demands of the community; and

Whereas, the 2014 WPD Patrol Staff Study was based on guidelines developed by the US Department of Justice - Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) and Michigan State University; and

Whereas, the WPD averages 175,000-180,000 calls for service per year; and

Whereas, for effective law enforcement, only 60% of an officer's time should be spent on calls; and

Whereas, averaging no more than 60% of time spent on calls allows for a proactive approach to community policing, including community outreach and engagement with youth, more officers participating in programs such as the Police Athletic League (PAL), Midnight Basketball, walking foot beats, community meetings and targeted focus patrols; and

Whereas, improved staffing levels would increase officer safety and help reduce the chances for critical incidents; and

Whereas, the study found that an additional 26 officers and 8 detectives are needed to achieve the recommended call ratio; and

Whereas, the estimated cost for 26 new officers in the first year will be \$2.9 million, which includes training, salaries, a vehicle, etc., with a recurring cost of \$1.6 million annually; and

Whereas, the estimated cost for 8 detectives is \$524,800 annually.

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved that the Board of Directors of the Wilmington Chamber of Commerce considers more effective law enforcement a priority and supports the Patrol Study findings to increase staffing levels at the WPD.
